Pakistan Occupied Jammu and Kashmir POJK is 72,935 sq. km less 5,180 sq. km of Shaksgam Valley leased to China in 1963. China Occupied Jammu & Kashmir COJK consists of 37,555 sq. km of Aksai Chin plus Shaksgam, and territory has nibbled over the years, totaling 42,735 sq. km. China should not forget that its China-Pakistan Economic Corridor CPEC, the flagship project of One Belt One Road OBOR, connecting Kashgar in China Xinjiang Province with Gwadar Port in Pakistan, passes through POJK, which is legally Indian territories. It is likely to climb up further as the full effect of the global shortages in crude oil, metals and farm products like oilseeds and wheat on the back of the Ukraine war kicks in. Forecasters are predicting inflation rates of 7 or more for at least seven more months with a peak of around 8 in June. Wholesale price inflation that measures factory and farm gate prices looks even more grim, printing at 14.55 for March. However, with a coastline of about 7,516 km and 17 of the world population, it is already at the frontline of the fallout of climate change. Therefore, it in our interest to enhance the use of non fossil fuel sources for incremental economic growth. Modi last year outlined a net zero commitment by 2070 as India overarching aim. It is to be realised through two interrelated steps by 2030. India is to reduce its projected carbon emissions by 1 billion tonnes and 50 of its energy needs are to be sourced through renewables. This is where India goals tie in with the EU vision. Having set a net zero targets by 2050, the EU is in the midst of a transition to sourcing most of its energy needs from renewables. Denmark, for example, has already sourced about 32 of its energy consumption in 2020 from renewables. Renewables represent a menu of energy options. In the EU, wind and water provide most of the renewable electricity. This is being complemented by solar. Advances in R&D are opening up more options which also allows countries to de risk their sourcing of renewable energy. Jharkhand chief minister Hemant Soren is on a sticky wicket, with the Election Commission asking him to explain why he should not be disqualified for securing a mining lease for himself. Soren is accused of violating Section 9A of the Representation of the People Act, which disqualifies MPs MLAs who enter into contracts with government for execution of works or supply of goods and Constitution Article 191, which disqualifies MLAs holding an office of profit under the government. Soren says that he has now surrendered the lease and had transparently mentioned it was due for renewal in his 2019 election affidavit. Jharkhand high court is also vetting the matter. Irrespective of the outcomes, Soren as minister in charge of the department and CM granting himself a lease reeks of conflict of interest. Gol Code of Conduct that applies to Union and state ministers specifically enjoins them to divest all interests in businesses primarily dependent on licences, permits, quotas, leases, etc received from the government. But unlike Soren rare case or the infamous 1993 JMM bribery scandal where illicit cash was deposited in bank accounts, high level corruption is tough to detect because netas depend on proxies like corporate groups, contractors and benamis where paper trails are hard to establish. The Jharkhand government is in disarray after this and other financial exposes against the Soren family. If Soren quits, there no clear line of succession. To make matters worse, the Congress JMM alliance has been turbulent. For BJP, JMM self inflicted wounds are a huge reprieve after being beaten in 2019 by tribal and minority votes consolidating. But Soren may not be the biggest casualty of the bruising legal and political battle. From 42 of Jharkhand population being multidimensionally poor and just 57 of those over 15 having received two doses of vaccines to its electricity woes, state capacity is already suffering from painful attention deficit disorder. No.326 of 2022 titled Mahua Moitra vs. State of Gujarat has been preferred by Mahua Moitra, a Member of Parliament from the Krishnanagar constituency in West Bengal, seeking issuance of a writ, order, or direction, quashing the Orders dated 10.08.2022. The petitioner in the said writ petition has also sought the framing of guidelines and the equitable application of existing guidelines by the State Government for the grant of remission so Parliament from the Krishnanagar as to channelise the exercise of discretion in granting remission and to prevent the misuse of such discretion, if found necessary upon an examination of the existing statutory framework. It is true that there appears to be a modern trend of giving punishment a colour of reformation so that stress may be laid on the reformation of the criminal rather than his confinement in jail which is an ideal objective. At the same time, it cannot be gainsaid that such an objective cannot be achieved without mustering the necessary facilities, the requisite education and the appropriate climate which must be created to foster a sense of repentance and penitence in a criminal so that he may undergo such a mental or psychological revolution that he realises the consequences of playing with human lives. Bilkis Yakub Rasool, being an unfortunate victim of the heinous crimes hereinabove narrated, has filed the present writ petition under Article 32 of the Constitution of India, seeking issuance of a writ, order or direction quashing the Orders dated 10.08.2022 passed by the State of Gujarat by which the convicts in Sessions Case No.634 Mumbai respondent Nos.3 to 13 herein, whose convictions were upheld by a Division Bench of the Bombay High Court and thereafter by this Court, have been released prematurely. 2.3. Enteric fermentation is the natural digestive process that occurs in the stomachs of cows and other ruminants, which produces methane as a by-product. Methane is a potent greenhouse gas, with a global warming potential 28 times higher than carbon dioxide. The dairy sector is responsible for around 30% of India methane emissions, and reducing these emissions could make a significant contribution to achieving net-zero. One way to reduce enteric fermentation is by improving the quality of feed provided to cows and buffaloes. High quality feed such as legumes and forage has been shown to decrease methane emissions by up to 30% while also enhancing animal health and productivity. Similarly, feed additives such as probiotics and enzymes can decrease methane emissions by up to 20%, and some Indian farmers have already reported a 15% reduction. However, to encourage broader adoption of these methods, significant investment in research and development, modifications to farming practices, and government and private sector support are necessary. In addition to improving feed quality and using feed additives, another approach to reducing emissions is through the use of renewable energy sources. Anhilwara Patan in north Gujarat was the capital of the Imperial Solanki aka Chaulukya dynasty that ruled much of Gujarat and parts of southern Rajasthan. After Emperor Ajaypala Solanki& son Mularaja II ascended the throne. Due to mother Naikidevi acted as the regent. Naikidevi was daughter of king Paramardi as per Acharya Merutunga Prabadh Chintamani. Prominent historian, AK Maunder, identifies this Paramardi as Paramardi Chancel jakabhukti based upon Prabandh Chintamani and Barra plates inscription. Parmardi successor Trailokyavarman Garra inscription Epigraphia with Kadambas of Goa. However. the Brahmin Kadambas of Goa have no historical ties with Rajput Solankis of Gujarat A K Maunder, Chalukyas of Gujarat, 131 AK Srivastava, Disintegration of North Indian Hindu States, p. 33 & 38. Even the Vaghelas, who came after the Solankis and Kadambas, did not marry the Seuna princes from the same region in south. The Madanpur inscription dated 1182 CE indicates Solanki help to Paramardi Chandella when Jejakabhukti was invaded by the Imperial Chauhans. It was a move by Naikidevi to release the pressure off her father Parma din Chandella. The Chandelles were a neighboring but independent power of Jejakabhukti present day Bundelkhad. The two armies met at Kasahrada near the foothills of Mt. Aby on the northern borders of the Solanki Empire. The Imperial Solanki forces led by Naikidevi Chancel Were reinforced by their feudatories Kelhan of Nadul Chauhans, Kirtipal of Jalore Chauhans, Abu Chandravati Parmars, and Durjanshalji Jhala. One of the heroic generals of the battle was the Gujarati Empire Prime Minister Jagadev Pratihara, who even finds mention in the Ola memorial inscription from Jaisalmer dated V.E. 1239 R Somani, Prithviraj Chauhan and His Times, p. 53. The Ghurid forces were badly defeated by the Imperial Solankis under Naikidevi Chancel as attested by Sundha Inscription of K

Gujarat and was defeated by the ruler of that country and with great difficulty reached Ghazni and obtained relief. This battle shook the invaders psyche so much that later another face off in the 13th century in the same place did reach armed conflict. Fearful of the same result, Turks retired without giving battle. Learning from the 1178 CE debacle, the Ghurid Emperor renewed his plans to invade India from Punjab facing Tamar Rajputs of Delhi, the Bhatt Rajputs of Banter and the expanding Imperial Chauhan power that began touching Sir hind. However, history is as intertwined with anthropology as much as it is with demography. A brief look the descendants of Imperial Solanki Rajputs are still found across both North Gujarat Patan, Mishanga, Banaskantha and Saurashtra. Similarly, the Nadul Chauhans are survived by the Balecha, Bodana and Balot branches of Chauhans. Kirtipala Chauhan of Jalore was an ancestor to both Songara branch of Jalore and Deora Chauhans of neighboring Sirohi. Danta & Santrampur have been headquarters of Abu Parmars, ever since they were forced to relocate by Deora Chauhans from Abu. Durjanshalji Jhala descendants went onto rule a part of Gujarat, that eventually became Zalavad. The Chancel clan of Naikidevi is found in eastern Bundelkhand and Purvanchal. The branch of Pratihara Rajputs, to which Jagadev Pratihar belonged, is predominantly found in South Gujarat especially Bharuch, Surat and Vadodara. The Battle of Kasahrada also marks an important but forgotten chapter in the Socio military history of Gurjaradesa Gau char bhoomi, the country of vast pasturelands covering North Gujarat and South Rajasthan. Its contours run the risk of being defiled by powers hell bent on instigating polarization in the society. It behoves to ask why the caste chauvinists of modern India often make such flimsy claims over histories and figures completely unrelated to them. This socio political phenomenon is termed Rajputization, where the said groups use state support, vote bank politics, money, and muscle power to either invent a Rajput past or fabricate association with a Rajput clan. Panarwa is located in hilly tracts of Mewar, called Bhomat. The Junior Rajput branches of the Yaduvanshi and Chauhan clans entered the Bhomat region in the 13th and 14th centuries, respectively. Later, the Yaduvanshis were forced to move by Solankis in the 15th century. Sarangdevot Sisodia Rajputs entered Bhomat in 16th centur

Descendant of the Solanki Kings of Anhilwara Patan. Akshayraj moved to the hills of Bhomat, where he fought a battle with Jeevraj, a Yaduvanshi Rajput. Hundreds of Solankis and Yaduvanshis were killed in the battle, along with Jeevraj and his son Udaibhan. Akshayraj Solanki established himself at Panarwa in 1478 AD. Majority of the population in this area were the Bhils, who accepted suzerainty of Akshayraj. Tej of Akshayraj, was contemporary of Maharana Udai Singh II of Mewar. When Maharana Udai Singh entered into Bhomat region a mark of gratitude, Maharana granted the title of Rana to Rawat Harpal. Since then, the chief of Panarwa was called Rana Paliwal, 2000. Harpal younger son Nahar Singh Naharu Ji established his control of Ogna after killing the Audichya Brahmin chief named Udairaj. Nahar Singh descendants continued to rule over Ogna, till Independence, with title of Rawat, surrounding the Mughal army which was stationed there, after the battle of Haldighati. Similar tactics to harass Mughal supply lines were used later as well. Rana Punja son, Rana Ram, took part in an attack on Mughal forces during the chiefs of Bhomat. Below table shows us various details about these chiefs, their annual income, tribute paid by them and their Judicial powers in the 1930s Sir Sukhdeo, 1935, Mewar Under Maharana Bhupal Singhji,p22. In 1945, judicial powers of Rana of Panarwa were upgraded to first class. During census of India, 1961, the village survey report recorded that the Thikanedar of Panarwa was a Solanki Rajput. The current head of Panarwa family is Rana Manohar Singh Solanki. In recent times, Political outfits, owing to the caste based politics are hijacking identities of historical figures, stoking feelings and false pride. Since Rana Punja name became famous by his association with Maharana Pratap, he became an easy target where many politicians are hell bent to paint Punja as a Bhil. Many people incorrectly believe that since Punja was from Bhomat and his followers were majorly Bhils, so he was also a Bhil. With complete disregard shown to historical proofs, records of Mewar State, Punja living descendants who are still living in Panarwa, a spree of installation of Rana Punja statues as a Bhil by Political outfits has occurred over the years. In 1989, Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi unveiled a statue of Rana Punja as Bhilu Raja Rana Punja, in Bhil attire at Pratap Smarak, Udaipur. However, it is unfair to place the burden of emissions reduction on Indian farmers, a demographic that is poverty-stricken and has not contributed to the crisis in a significant manner. A majority of farmers in the country fall under the small or marginal categories and they are the ones who are already facing the brunt of climate change. Both state and non-state actors have tried to promote more sustainable practices among farmers, in the form of the National Mission for Sustainable Agriculture or Zero Budget Natural Farming. However, since the bulk of the financial burden remains with the farmer, such efforts have hitherto failed to achieve adoption at scale. For example, during our fieldwork in the severely degraded district of Raichur in Karnataka, we met a cotton farmer whose yields have been worsening every year. He told us that he was still hesitant to switch to more sustainable practices such as multilayered agroforestry, a farming practice that can check soil erosion, promote carbon sequestration, and provide financial benefits to the farmer. Despite the advantages, this switch cannot happen because the farmer would need to pay upfront for crop residue management, organic manure, and new seeds, besides having to establish new market linkages. Moreover, it would take time for fertility to improve as a result of these changes. How would the farmer tide over this period? A single tweak in policy, such as broadening the ambit of minimum support price (MSP) to include crops such as millets, is insufficient. It is necessary, therefore, to find alternate sources of financing to buttress farmers against risks and encourage them to move away from the unsustainable practices they are locked into. To offset their own emissions, and a seller in this case the farmer who reduces emissions or sequesters carbon and can thus receive payments in return. Carbon credits can then not only serve as a monetary incentive for farmers to switch to alternate farming methods but also allow them to earn an income for every unit of greenhouse gas removed from the atmosphere. Many practices to reduce emissions already exist in agriculture. For instance, the water from flood-irrigated paddy fields often blocks oxygen and prevents it from penetrating the soil this creates an environment suitable for methane-producing bacteria. This greenhouse gas is several times more potent than carbon dioxide. Flood irrigation also requires huge amounts of water as it literally involves flooding the fields for cultivation. Studies have shown that replacing flood irrigation with direct seeding of rice, that is, a more sustainable method of directly sowing seeds into the soil instead of transplanting seedlings from nurseries to waterlogged fields, reduces methane emissions. Other practices such as switching from monocultures of rice to a patchwork of rice, millets, and oil seeds or even regenerative agricultural practices like cover cropping have the potential improve soil health and mitigate emissions in the long run. What is missing, however, is an accompanying carbon credit system that will enable farmers to earn an income while switching their farming practices. What will it take to develop a robust carbon credit regime for Indian farmers? One low-hanging option is to attach carbon financing to existing government programmers that reduce emissions or sequester carbon. There are some immediate examples where this could be attempted. First is the Prada Mantri Kisan Urja Suraksha exam Utthaan Mahabhiyan Scheme, the flagship solar irrigation scheme that the Ministry of New and Renewable Energy launched in 2019 to improve energy security. In places without grid-connected electricity, farmers are using solar-powered irrigation pumps that replace diesel generators, but without the option to sell this excess energy back to the grid. Attaching carbon financing to this scheme could provide more income for farmers. There has been significant emphasis on natural farming through the Bharatiya Pruritic Krishi Paddhati Programmed, which aims to improve soil fertility and soil organic matter. Section 17 1 of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act PMLA empowers the Enforcement Directorate ED to conduct searches and seize records or property under specific conditions. This authority is triggered when the ED has information or a reasonable belief that a person is i engaged in money laundering, ii possesses proceeds from money laundering, iii holds records related to money laundering, or IV has property connected to criminal activities. The ED power to search and seize is broad and does not require a person to be formally accused under Section 3 of the PMLA. Mere possession of property linked to a crime can lead to seizure. If seizure is not feasible, Section 17 1-A allows the ED to freeze the property. Once frozen, the property cannot be transferred without authorization from the freezing authority. The court can validate seizure or freezing orders under Section 17, similar to how property attachments are confirmed under Section 8. Process of Attachment and Confiscation under Section 8 of PMLA When an authorized officer, such as a Deputy Director, believes that a property should be attached; they issue a provisional attachment order. This order is communicated to all concerned parties and forwarded to the Adjudicating Authority for review under Section 8 of the Act. The Adjudicating Authority reviews the complaint within 30 days and, if satisfied that the property is involved in money laundering, confirms the attachment. The confirmed attachment continues for up to 365 days or until proceedings under the PMLA are concluded. Dissatisfied individuals can appeal to the Appellate Tribunal within 45 days, and the Tribunal can confirm, modify, or overturn the original decision. Further appeals can be made to the High Court within 60 days of the Tribunal order. The confiscation of property is determined by a Special Court, which orders confiscation if it finds that money laundering has occurred. If no wrongdoing is found, the property is returned to its rightful owner. Once confiscated, all rights in the property vest absolutely in the Central Government free from all encumbrances as per Section 9 of PMLA. Section 8 3 a : pendency of the proceedings Section 8 3 allows the Court to confirm the ED attachment, seizure, or freezing of property, specifying that such actions can last up to 365 days or until the related proceedings conclude. If a confiscation order is issued, the attachment becomes final. In India case, WHO estimates the excess mortality to be 4.7 million, almost 10 times the reported deaths Gol has disputed the findings as it disagrees with the methodology underpinning WHO statistical model. There are two important technical points here. Excess mortality is the difference between the deaths that have occurred and the number that would be expected in the absence of Covid. As all countries did not have the relevant data for the two year period studied, alternative data sources were used for such countries, including India. The WHO estimate, therefore, is final. Indonesia was once ruled by the Shailendra dynasty, which as the name suggested was of Indian origin. Indonesia still has a sizable Hindu population in Bali and some other areas. I remember as a child I used to take part in the famous Boita Bandana sailing boat festival in my native place of Odisha. In this ancient tradition, every year children at a particular time of the year get up early in morning, go to nearby ponds, rivers and other water bodies and sail boats made of paper, thermocol and banana bark, with candles and earthen lamps on top of them. One could see and revel at the scene of thousands of boats sailing through the ponds and rivers. This festival celebrates the ancient tradition of trade between the eastern part of India and faraway places such as Java and Sumatra. There are popular Odia stories and dramas such as Taipei, reflecting how the ancient trade connections were also part of local heritage. I am narrating such stories and their historical connections to point out the significance of India cultural reach across continents through means of trade, religion one can think of Hinduism and Buddhism in this context, and myths an

Struggle against injustice and oppression in South Africa and India. Foreign minister articulated so clearly the policy amid a global crisis, in an international dialogue forum. Hardly a foreign minister articulated so fearlessly, even while earning opprobrium from some diplomats and politicians at home and abroad, that India past of submissiveness and trepidation is gone. While articulating that India condemns war and violence in Ukraine, conceding that the war violates sovereign democratic rights of Ukraine, and accepting that the war violates the UN Charter, India decided not to condemn Russia in the way as wanted by some of the participating leaders in the Dialogue. More so, on contentious border issues with Pakistan, China, and about peace and stability in Afghanistan, such a policy will distance Russia from India. The top leaders of both the countries meet every year, they have joint collaborations like BrahMos a combination of Brahmaputra and Moscow. The dictate of realpolitik suggests India follows a cautious path even though Russia invasion violates Ukraine independence and territorial integrity, the UN Charter, and equally importantly, it undermines democracy. But, as articulated by Jaishankar, while Ukraine is a major global issue demanding attention, it is also necessary that other pressing issues are not undermined. The conflicts in Asia, the developments in the Himalayan region, and the prospects of violent conflicts in the South China Sea, or in Ladakh, or in Koreas cannot be ignored. China silence on Ukraine could make more sense as it is not a democratic state, but India as the largest democracy could not stay silent when there is an onslaught on another democracy, or democratic principles that is the argument made by the US and its European allies. This argument has some justification and India as the largest democracy cannot simply stay on the sidelines amidst this global crisis, which has the potential to redefine the global order. But as realist prudence demands, India cannot simply undertake a moralist standpoint and ignore the dictates of realpolitik. Jaishankar tried to make a fine balance between the realpolitik and moral concerns while addressing international concerns on the war in Ukraine. The immediate national interest clouds the larger moral goals that is how international politics apparently operates now, but from a long range perspective the undermining of democracy will not bode well for the world. Experts tell us which type of democracy is better and which is worse, but keeping aside this typology of democracies, it is true that the recent years have seen a dip in democratic values, even in

One can find an honest confession from the top Indian diplomat that India, despite being the largest democracy, could not leverage its democratic assets, its human resources and hard power potentials. The Indian leadership seems to be aware of these issues and taking steps to address them. A country cannot be powerful abroad if it is weak at home. As I argued elsewhere India soft power assets make sense when they are supported by its hard power. The ideal of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam could only be built on solid foundations. Former President of known as missile man, repeatedly made the case that India can play an effective role on the world stage when it is strong internally as well as externally. India foreign exchange reserves have dropped to below \$600 billion, a 7 fall in just the past six months. The reason for the fall is either that people both Indians and foreigners are taking dollars out of India, or that the Reserve Bank of India RBI has been selling dollars to decrease the pressure on a declining rupee. Sharp rupee depreciation is bad news since it makes our imports expensive. Crude oil imports alone were \$120 billion during last fiscal year. If the rupee slides, crude oil becomes expensive, which affects domestic price of petrol and diesel, contributing to inflation. On the other hand, the rupee cannot be allowed to get too strong, because it will hurt our exports. The optimal level of the exchange rate is managed by the RBI. This dollar rupee rate is the most important price which is managed in the economy. To manage the exchange rate the RBI needs to have some stock of foreign exchange, which is currently just below \$600 billion. Is that too much Strangely this question has been recurring for almost 15 years. Even when India forex stock reached \$100 billion some people started asking whether it was excessive. One of the benchmarks used to measure whether forex is adequate or not is how many months of imports it can support. This past year our import bill was around \$620 billion. So, our current forex stock can pay for 12 months of imports. That seems like a safe stock. Hence, some people have suggested that India should have its own sovereign wealth fund just like Abu Dhabi, Saudi Arabia, Norway, Singapore or China. All these countries have a very large stock of foreign exchange. But the first three of them are large oil exporters and have windfall gains from high oil prices, and their own domestic consumption of oil is very low. The last two, Singapore and China, are also major exporters and consistently have a current account surplus, ice exports always exceed imports. India case is very different. It does not have any windfall gains from oil or any other commodity exports. Secondly, it consistently has a current account deficit, sometimes as high as 2 or 3 of GDP. So, India is constantly running short of dollars on its trade.

Account the reason that India has ample supply of dollars is because its trade deficit is financed by foreign investors via the capital account. This includes money flowing into the stock market, via foreign loans and by nonresident Indians keeping fixed deposits in Indian banks. And of course through foreign direct investment FDI in projects, companies and startups. However, everything except FDI is hot money. It can easily be reversed. There can be sudden stops to stock market inflows. It a great testament to the confidence of foreign investors in India prospects that for past more than three decades they have poured investment dollars, which has taken our forex stock from barely \$1 billion in 1991 to \$600 billion in 2022. The call for using some of India forex stock to form an SWF is also because RBI earns barely 1 or 2 returns on its forex stock, which is mainly invested in the US and other sovereign bonds. By its charter, the RBI is not allowed to invest in any other asset, since it has to park the foreign exchange in only safe assets. On the other hand, other countries with large forex carve out a big fund into an SWF, which in turn is allowed to invest in more risky assets and earn a higher return. There have been calls for India too to have its own SWF to use some of its own forex more productively. In a way we already have a SWF which is called The National Investment and Infrastructure Fund NIIF, set up in 2016 and managed by a government appointed team to leverage foreign investment into India. So far, its size is about \$4 billion and its investments, mainly in the form of equity, are across sectors including infrastructure, e commerce and perhaps future unicorns. But, \$4 billion is but a drop out of \$600 billion. The main thing to realise is that India needs a largish pile of forex as insurance against sudden flight of foreign capital, which can leave us in the lurch. It happened in 1997 to East Asian countries like Thailand. Ever since then many developing countries started having their own dollar pile as self insurance. Since Sri Lanka did not have adequate forex stock it has defaulted and is facing bankruptcy in foreign obligations. India does not have the luxury of being an oil exporter like Abu Dhabi nor does it have a current account surplus like Singapore or China. If it wants to secure higher returns for its forex, it can diversify away from dollar assets to euro or other currencies. But as of now the dollar is king and our forex stock, safely managed by RBI is our insurance. In this coming year of high oil prices and inflation and slowing growth, it makes sense to conserve our forex. Even if you are part of the fortunate minority whose life is personally pretty good, it hard not to be buffeted by the turbulent world around us.

The quality of education, human resource, and research in them. Further, in this programmer, it was desired from the HEIs to create an appropriate eco system for revenue generation which is hardly visible now. The term loan is disturbing the academic fraternity because public sector HEIs will have to strategize repayment of the loan amount. The traditional practice of receiving grants by state HEIs was completely devoid of any repayment. The change in the financing model from grant to loan is embedded with challenges before HEIs for creating surplus and paying it back in the stipulated period. Besides this it will be obligating the HEIs to evolve strategies for achieving excellence along with earning surplus and become competitive. Introspection of the financial health of the majority of state run HEIs points to an acute shortage of funds in carrying out the bare minimum of teaching learning and associated processes. The prevailing shortage of teachers met by contractual teachers guest faculty and staff shortage met through outsourced contractual staff incurs lesser expenditure on teacher & staff salaries, it has been a blessing in disguise for the most of the HEIs in meeting their salary needs from the available grant. However, the fund requirement for removing obsolescence, maintenance, infrastructure addition, and sustaining the ongoing activities is not met sufficiently in regular grants. As a result, the HEIs usually get funds for specific activities based on the projects submitted by them to the regulators. Nevertheless, the shortage of funds in HEIs for offering good quality education is ubiquitous for quite a long. The Kothari Commission has recommended the enhancement of public spending on education to the tune of 6 of GDP in the 1968 policy which was also endorsed by the National Policy of Education in 1986. The recent National Education Policy NEP 2020 also prescribed the increase in public investment by the Centre and States together to reach 6 of GDP at the earliest. Thus in every policy framework, it has been reiterated to meet expenditure on education through grants coming from the public exchequer. The sanction of loans to state controlled HEIs for running them calls for revenue generation at their end to return the money as per laid down schedule. There is no problem with the loan and its repayment for any commercial entity, but the same is extremely difficult for the state controlled HEIs which have been primarily instituted with welfare and service to society motives. The protagonists of this paradigm shift in the financing of state HEIs from grants to loans draw cues from the similarly placed HEIs of the private sector that are run in a self financed mode. Nonetheless, the comparison between private sector HEIs and public sector HEIs can not be done on account of various social obligations and adherence to salary norms by the latter while the former enjoys somewhat freedom on it. If we did get such forums, we would never be able to speak about existing problems. The panchayat officials we have interacted with also consider gram sabhas to be a positive influence. Acknowledging the importance of children perspectives, Digvijay Bodke, CEO of Ramanagara zilla panchayat, tells us, we need to think from children point of view to understand their problems. Makalu gram sabhas helps us understand what is going on in their minds. To enable more inclusivity and safe opportunities for children, gram panchayat officials ensure that children voice boxes are placed in schools and other public spaces, and in the sabha. The presence of key decision makers It is critical that representatives and accountable officials from the gram panchayat including the president of the panchayat, other elected members, the PDO, officials from the education department, the ASHA worker and Anganwadi teacher, and child rights agencies are in attendance, as this plays a major role in making the children village sabha productive. It is only when these officials attend that correct information can be provided to the children, and the adults responsible for the care of children.
